Why is hand hygiene important?

- Easiest and most important thing we can do to stop the spread of germs
- Most visible way patients and families see we are performing infection prevention
- Regulatory compliance
- External recognition







Five Moments of Hand Hygiene

Before touching a patient

Before a procedure/surgery

After touching a patient

After touching patient surroundings


After touching any blood/body fluid

Direct Observation Monitoring

- Trained observers "Secret Shoppers" or coaches
- Allow for all moments of hand hygiene to be observed and counted
- Identify barriers and reasons for non-compliance
- Diverse group of staff roles, departments, shifts
- Incorporate leaders and infection prevention





Direct Observation Monitoring

Secret Shopper

- + Anonymity
- No behavior correction
 - Turnover

Coach

- + Proactive intervention
- + Less turnover
- Dependent on safety culture

Hawthorne Effect

- Behavior exhibited is modified based on the person being observed
- "It's Hawthorne until it's habit."
- Vary days, times, shifts when performing monitoring
- Data transparency
- Patient and family engagement

Giving Feedback

- Treat it like a competency
- How to begin the observation
- Providing positive and constructive feedback
- Role play positive/negative feedback scenarios
- Use of scripting





Data Collection

- Adequate volume of observations
- Paper audit tool
 - Preferred by staff without computer access
 - Requires manual data entry and analysis
 - Difficult to track volume of observations
- Electronic audits
 - Web-based survey tool
 - Computer, tablet, or other mobile device
 - Allows for data to be submitted real-time







Safety Culture and Hand Hygiene

- Organizational and unit-specific culture survey results
- Share culture survey results with coaches
- Senior leader and infection prevention engagement with operational leaders
- What is driving non-compliance?
 - Knowledge deficit
 - Real or perceived barriers
 - Peer behaviors
